

Purdue Menaces Poor Hawks

Home Edge Not Enough For Upset

Iowa's football team hopes to salvage some victories this season that will enable the Hawkeyes to escape the Big Ten cellar for the first time since 1963, but that ambitious project may have to wait two more weeks.

Because of Iowa's perverse schedule, the Hawks are at home the next two Saturdays, but their guests are two of the toughest teams in this fading old conference. Purdue (groan) comes in Saturday highly favored to curdle Iowa's homecoming, and Minnesota (ugh) is the visitor the following Saturday at Dads day.

If the Hawkeyes survive these two orges, observers give them some kind of chance of winning one or two of the final games against Northwestern, Ohio State and Illinois. Only trouble there is that Iowa must go on the perfidious road again to play Northwestern and Ohio State.

The home advantage is a valuable one. Many think Iowa could have won its last two games with just the slightest home edge. Indiana rallied to beat the Hawks 21-17 on a fake field goal with less than a minute to play. Wisconsin tied Iowa 21-21 with 4:17 to go.

Any handicap of playing on the road is not expected to be enough to derail Purdue Saturday. The Boilermakers come here at peak strength. Their soph quarterback, Mike Phipps, is the nation's total offense leader and ranks sixth nationally in passing.

They also will be counting heavily on two fine pass receivers, Leroy Keyes and Jim Beirne. Keyes has caught 29 for 488 yards and one of them was a 78-yarder. He threatens to break Beirne's school record for one season. Beirne has hooked 21 for 341 yards this year.

Iowa does not come unarmed. Tailback Si McKinnie is the Big Ten's top ground gainer and Eddie Podolak is a dangerous threat by land or air. But Iowa's defense has given up two yards short of 2,000 in five games. That's 400 yards per opponent.


Iowa's defense also has leaked for 145 points — an average of 29 points for each of five foes. The offense can't keep up with that, averaging only 17 points.

Arnold Palmer, although not the tourney favorite, survived a horrendous first round 76 and qualified for the final 36 holes.

Spray, with 69-64 — 133, held a two-stroke lead over Goalby, 68-67 — 135, and youthful Terry Dill 67-68 — 135.

Spoilermakers Still

IT IS CERTAIN, of course, Purdue cannot return to the Rose Bowl this year. Even if the Boilermakers win the title outright, they are forbidden by Big Ten rule to play at Pasadena twice in a row.

When this season began, a Big Ten Skywriter approached Coach Jack Mollenkopf with this question: "Duffy Daugherty of Michigan State says he has done research and the Big Ten team that went to the Rose Bowl has wound up in fifth place, on the average, the following season. Do you fear that kind of a drop-off for Purdue?"

"What the devil!" spluttered the fiery Mollenkopf. "Do you think we'll wind up SIXTH because we went to the Rose Bowl as the runnerup team last year? No, I think this depends entirely on the team's pride, and I certainly don't believe my team will slip that far."

Well, Purdue may not win the Big Ten title, or even a piece of it. But a glance at the schedule will tell you the Boilermakers certainly will have a great deal to say about which team does go Rose Bowling.

In its last three games Purdue plays Minnesota and Michigan State at home and finishes at Indiana. If this Purdue team has the kind of pride Mollenkopf hopes it has, Minnesota, Michigan State and Indiana may find out why they sometimes call Purdue the "Spoilermakers."

The day before that season finale at Indiana, the Purdue head coach will attain his 62nd birthday. We wonder if Jack Mollenkopf isn't the oldest active head coach in major-college football.

Most coaches his age have long since retired to the relative security of a rocking chair or an athletic director's job. But Jack has survived such perils as howling alumni, lynch-minded student publications and a cancer operation to remain one of the most vigorous coaches in the game.

Jack happens to be one of our favorite coaches. He won't be very flattered when we add that Woody Hayes is another one. They're two different kinds of men, but both are wonderfully uninhibited news sources for us ink-stained wretches in the press coops.

He also heads one of football's best coaching staffs. Most of his aides are long-time friends of ours—Al Hager, Ned Maloney, Bob DeMoss, Don Fuoss, Burnie Miller (who served time at Iowa State) and Al Parker. The newer men—Jerry Stoltz, Wimp Hewgley and Ron Meyer—hold impressive credentials, too.

Despite being third among current conference coaches in Big Ten winning percentage (42-27-5 before this season,) he has never had a conference champion in 20 years at Purdue—nine as an assistant and 11 as head coach.

Even though Jack looks and acts indestructible, at 61 and 11/12ths he is nearing the end of the line as a head coach. We wouldn't mind seeing him win a Big Ten title for Purdue before he hangs up his whistle.

Peppers Picks Warily: Purdue

We wrote last week we would give the Iowa football team one more chance to win and picked them to defeat Wisconsin. The 21-21 tie didn't discourage us. We still think the Hawks will win one or two Big Ten games, but this isn't the week with a strong Purdue team invading Iowa's homecoming... IOWA CITY — Cedar Rapids Regis Coach Tom Good appeared to be in a state of semi-shock here Thursday night following his club's game with Regina.

"I've never had a team play in anything like that," the Royals' boss said, shaking his head in disbelief. Good had reference to a driving snowstorm that struck Iowa City at 3 p.m. and by kickoff time had deposited nearly four inches of snow and slush on the Regina field. The snow and slush continued throughout the game, making playing conditions miserable to say the least.

The weather proved to be a tremendous equalizer as Regis, the state's third-rated eleven, had to score twice in the second

half for a 14-0 win to bring its record to a perfect 7-0 for the season.

The victory set the stage for what has to be regarded as the state's game of the year a week from Saturday when Regis hosts No. 1 rated Waterloo East at Kingston stadium.

Regina Coach Bernie Wyatt thought the weather conditions "were just beautiful!" Wyatt's Regals were 2-3 going into the game and in justice to them had to play with many

starters sidelined with injuries.

"Regis showed in the second half they had a good football team," offered Wyatt. "They came right out at the start of the second half and hurt us. It was their fullback Steve Havlik's run that broke our back."

Havlik didn't play at all in the first half but started after intermission. The first time he carried the ball was in a third and two situation on Regina's 22 yard line.

Havlik, a 182-pounder, burst off left guard for 16 yards to the six, and on the next play halfback Mike Jennings streaked into the end zone to break the scoreless tie. Kevin Bode split the uprights with the first of his two successful conversions and the Royals had all the scoring they needed.

Regis' final TD climaxed a 43-yard drive to start the final

quarter. It took nine plays with halfback Ted Boudreau hitting the left side from four yards out for the six-pointer.

The weather, along with some fine Regina defensive play, hindered Regis' vaunted passing attack. QB Steve Egger completed only two of 11 for nine yards in the first half and had three interceptions. The Royals did not attempt any passes in the last half.

Boudreau paced the ground gainers with 99 yards in 16 rushes. Regis fullback Joe Matejka blasted for 75 yards (20 carries), while Havlik had four tries for 31 yards. Regina was led by halfback Joe Halseh with 43 yards in 12 carries.

a 21-0 lead after Doug Lane's conversion. Cougar Ron Cook then fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Jeff's Les Rogers pounced on the ball at the Cougar 20. Fullback Tom Fontana carried 12 yards to set up quarterback Ron Heidt's eight-yard TD run with 8:55 showing.

Kennedy managed only three penetrations into Jeff territory in the second half and the one threat that was halted at the J-Hawk 12 later gave the Cougars their only points.

The Cougars held at the 12, but an offside infraction moved the ball back to the seven. Then a mixup in the Jeff backfield sent the loose ball squirting into the end zone where Kennedy's Steve Hines fell on it for the tally.

"We were pleased with our defense," Jeff Boss Jack Fisk said after the game. "And we had to use almost a completely different secondary because of injuries."

"Gary Martin, Dave Wilkey and Garry Birkicht didn't even dress, but Les Rogers and Mike Cole did a good job. Ron Pierce and Tim Spacek also played good defense. And you have to admit the weather conditions hurt Heidt's passing."

Kennedy was held to a minus-three yards rushing in the final half and managed only 77 yards total offense against the rugged J-Hawk defense.

Fontana, who led all ball carriers with 101 yards in 17 carries, scored the opening Jeff TD on an eight-yard burst and his 45-yard run in the second period set up Heidt's first tally on a one-yard pounce.

"Jeff's defense was good, yes," Tryon said, "but we felt our middle three — Roger Bir, Hines and Louvar — also did an outstanding job containing their running game over-all."

Ripon, which has won or shared the Midwest conference football championship for the last four years, will throw five all-conference players at the Kohawks in Coe's 1:30 p.m. homecoming game Saturday at Kingston stadium.

the Holiday Inn. The "C" club (Coe alumni lettermen) will sponsor an 11 a.m. brunch Saturday in Gage union. Both events are open to all alumni and friends of the college.

In addition to Long, the Ripon Redmen will have two other first team all-conference choices in the starting lineups. They are halfback LaVerne Pottinger and tackle Scott Mathot, who also does Ripon's place kicking. Second team all-conference choices among the starters are end Jim Clark, tackle John Corso and linebacker Noel Julian.

It will be no new story to the Kohawks to go into the homecoming battle as the underdog, despite the fact both clubs have identical 3-2 records. Ripon, ranked as a pre-season favorite to repeat as champion, will be bounding back from two straight defeats. One was the season's biggest loop upset when Monmouth upended Ripon and the other came last Saturday at the hands of undefeated Lawrence.

Coe also lost to Lawrence and was whitewashed by St. Olaf. However, the Kohawks will be gunning for their third upset of the year, having surprised Beiloit and Cornell. Coe's other victory was over Carleton in a game which had been rated a toss-up.
