Pow! Washington stuns Hempstead, 20-0

No one could remember when an unranked football team had so thoroughly outplayed a No. 1 ranked team.

That was the scene Friday night at Kingston Stadium, after unsung Cedar Rapids Washington drubbed No. 1 Dubuque Hempstead 20-0 to take sole possession of first place in the Mississippi Valley Conference.

"That might be the best football game I've ever seen a Washington team play," said long-time Wash statistician Dick Reeder.

"We couldn't have been better," said Wash Coach Wally Sheets, whose Warriors cleverly chose their homecoming to stop a six-game losing streak against Hempstead.

"I'd just like to say that Wally Sheets and I have had our differences in the past," said Hempstead Coach Bob Timmerman, "but tonight he definitely out-coached us and his kids definitely outplayed ours."

Indeed they did. The Warriors dominated every phase of the game:

Rushing: Led by fullback Tim Zimmerman and tailback Greg Bjornsen, Wash rushed 46 times for 213 yards against a Hempstead defense which had allowed minus 6 yards against four previous Valley foes and which averages 223 pounds tackle-to-tackle.

And the Wash defense bent for only 100 yards in 38 runs by Hempstead, which had been averaging 256 yards rushing in the Valley.

Passing: Warrior quarterback Pat Dale completed 13 of 19 passes for

156 yards, far outshining Hempstead QB Dave Delaney, who connected on only one of six for 18 yards.

And Wash blockers allowed Hempstead's blitzing defense to sack Dale only one time, and that came on Wash's second play.

First downs: Wash had 21 compared to Hempstead's eight. And the Mustangs' initial first down in the game didn't come until 1:07 was left in the first half.

Scoring drives: The Wash touchdowns weren't gifts, as the Warriors scored on drives of 54 yards in eight plays, 89 yards in 13 plays and 75

vards in 15 plays. Hempstead went past midfield on only one series, following a 33-yard kickoff return to the Wash 44. The

march ended at the Wash 27. "I just felt," said Sheets, "that one of these nights we'd put everything together, and tonight we did."

'Wally Sheets did an outstanding job of coaching," said Timmerman, who had been 6-0 against Wash. "He used a defense that I, personally, was not aware of.

"Wash really got up for this game. You could tell it. The crowd was awake and the players were inspired. I can't understand how they've lost a couple of games, because this was the worst licking we've received at Hempstead.'

Hempstead's defense didn't know what to defend against, as the Warriors skillfully mixed runs with passes. Dale's favorite receiver was Gary Clark, who caught five for 89 yards, giving him 39 catches this



The unions said the agreements provide for full retroactive pay back to Jan. 1, 1978. Retroactive pay had been one of the main issues.

Fletcher said the new BRAC agreement also includes a provision industry wage, which had been another issue in the BRAC strike.

Fletcher said because of the Rock Island's "financial condition," BRAC had agreed to take the retroactive pay in installments, instead of asking for it all at once.

It was not immediately known whether the UTU retroactive wages would be paid in installments or in · one lump sum.

Ted Zirbes, a spokesman for the railroad, confirmed "an agreement had been worked out yesterday," but said it was not supposed to be announced until Monday and then by the presidential emergency board appointed to help resolve the strike.

Zirbes said he could not reveal any more details of the agreement "because I haven't seen it."

BRAC went on strike against the Rock Island Aug. 28 and the UTU joined the walkout the next day.

"Fugitive dust" refers to particulates from grain fields and gravel roads. It cannot be controlled and, therefore, places an unfair burden on industry when an agricultural state undertakes to gain compliance with EPA standards.
