Hawks, Gophers ready to battle for the 'bacon'

IOWA CITY — The winner will take home the "bacon."

Iowa and Minnesota, two teams with striking similarities, will clash before a sellout crowd in Kinnick Stadium in Iowa's homecoming Saturday, and both teams will be pulling out all the stops in the annual contest for Floyd of Rosedale, a traveling trophy created as part of a wager between the governors of Iowa and Minnesota.

The 15½-inch bronze statue of a national championship hog was first awarded in 1935, and the Gophers claimed it last year with a 22-20 win. The two teams have been battling since 1891, and Minnesota holds the edge, 48-22-2.

"Minnesota presents a great challenge for us," said Iowa head coach

Hayden Fry. "Any team that can score three times on Michigan has got to have an outstanding offense. Minnesota appears to be as good as any team we've played."

Iowa is currently in a three-way tie for third in the Big Ten with a 2-1 record, 3-3 overall, while Minnesota is sixth at 2-2, also 3-3 overall.

There are similarities statistically between the two squads. Minnesota is averaging 358 yards per game in total offense, Iowa 342. Minnesota has scored 145 points, Iowa 154. And both teams have run the same number of plays — 422.

"Iowa is a good football team," said Minnesota head coach Joe Salem. "They have proved to be an advantageous team — one that takes advantage of every opportunity."

"They've turned fumble recoveries and interceptions into scores, and that's the sign of a good club."

Iowa has also established its ground game behind tailback Dennis Mosley, who has totaled 803 yards this season to lead the Big Ten. He is shy of the single-season record of 937 and also short of the career mark of 1,927 with 1,669 total in his four years.

Last week against Northwestern, in the Hawkeyes' 58-6 romp, Iowa recorded its most total yards since 1969 and most yards rushing since 1975.

"We needed that," said Fry. "We really did need a game like this — one where we blew somebody out of the water."

"We've been on the verge of ex-

ploding, so we weren't too surprised. We definitely knew it was coming."

Salem, in his first season as coach at Minnesota, knows what effect the Iowa victory has on Saturday's battle.

"It will be another tough assignment," said Salem, whose team dropped a 31-21 league game to Michigan last week. "Maybe it would have been easier if Iowa had faltered a little bit against Northwestern last Saturday, but when they won 58-6, we got the message that the Hawks were ready."

Fry has indicated during practice sessions this week his team is battered and bruised but won't say who is hurt nor how badly.

Gordy Bohannon drew the starting quarterback job over Pete Gales

and Phil Sues, though Fry says all three are very similar in style.

"All three are very intelligent," said Fry, "all three are very intent and all are leaders and have respect by their teammates, and mechanically, they're very good."

Fry says Bohannon, a junior college transfer, "throws the best ball," yet he added none of the trio has the game experience to be considered outstanding.

In Bohannon's first start last week, he made 7 of 11 passes for 101 yards, threw two touchdown passes and also scored two TDs himself.

The Los Angeles, Calif., native's first pass to receiver Keith Chappelle went for 44 yards and a touchdown — a familiar feat for the duo

Pow! Washington stuns Hempstead, 20-0

No one could remember when an unranked football team had so thoroughly outplayed a No. 1 ranked team.

That was the scene Friday night at Kingston Stadium, after unsung Cedar Rapids Washington drubbed No. 1 Dubuque Hempstead 20-0 to take sole possession of first place in the Mississippi Valley Conference.

"That might be the best football game I've ever seen a Washington team play," said long-time Wash statistician Dick Reeder.

"We couldn't have been better," said Wash Coach Wally Sheets, whose Warriors cleverly chose their homecoming to stop a six-game losing streak against Hempstead.

"I'd just like to say that Wally Sheets and I have had our differences in the past," said Hempstead Coach Bob Timmerman, "but tonight he definitely out-coached us and his kids definitely outplayed ours."

Indeed they did. The Warriors dominated every phase of the game: Rushing: Led by fullback Tim Zimmerman and tailback Greg Bjornsen, Wash rushed 46 times for 213 yards against a Hempstead defense which had allowed minus 6 yards against four previous Valley foes and which averages 223 pounds tackle-to-tackle.

And the Wash defense bent for only 100 yards in 38 runs by Hempstead, which had been averaging 256 yards rushing in the Valley.

Passing: Warrior quarterback Pat Dale completed 13 of 19 passes for

156 yards, far outshining Hempstead QB Dave Delaney, who connected on only one of six for 18 yards.

And Wash blockers allowed Hempstead's blitzing defense to sack Dale only one time, and that came on Wash's second play.

First downs: Wash had 21 compared to Hempstead's eight. And the Mustangs' initial first down in the game didn't come until 1:07 was left in the first half.

Scoring drives: The Wash touchdowns weren't gifts, as the Warriors scored on drives of 54 yards in eight plays, 89 yards in 13 plays and 75 yards in 15 plays.

Hempstead went past midfield on only one series, following a 33-yard kickoff return to the Wash 44. The march ended at the Wash 27.

"I just felt," said Sheets, "that one of these nights we'd put everything together, and tonight we did."

"Wally Sheets did an outstanding job of coaching," said Timmerman, who had been 6-0 against Wash. "He used a defense that I, personally, was not aware of."

"Wash really got up for this game. You could tell it. The crowd was awake and the players were inspired. I can't understand how they've lost a couple of games, because this was the worst licking we've received at Hempstead."

Hempstead's defense didn't know what to defend against, as the Warriors skillfully mixed runs with passes. Dale's favorite receiver was Gary Clark, who caught five for 89 yards, giving him 39 catches this

Kennedy drops 4th straight

IOWA CITY — Things can't get much worse for Cedar Rapids Kennedy.

Coach Greg Reed's Cougars not only had to sit through a five-minute rainstorm before Friday night's Mississippi Valley Conference game with Iowa City High, but the Cougars also suffered their fourth straight loss, a 22-7 defeat that saw their mark sink to 2-4 in conference action and 2-5 for the season.

The Cougars have now been outscored in their last four games 64-21, with losses to Dubuque Hempstead and crosstown rivals Washington and Jefferson.

Friday was a long night for the Cougars as they spun their way to only seven yards rushing in 31 carries through the muddy quagmire, but junior quarterback Jim McDonald did account for 140 yards passing, including a 25-yard scoring strike to Greg Spicher with just two seconds remaining in the contest.

Iowa City got on the board with 2:32 left in the first quarter as Don Comings went over from one yard out.

The son of former University of Iowa football coach Bob Comings also scored the Little Hawks final touchdown with a similar run in the fourth quarter.

Coach Clyde Bean's Little Hawks are now 3-3 in conference play and 4-3 overall.

E. Buchanan 35 Alburnett 12

WINTHROP — With five backs scoring a touchdown apiece, East Buchanan (5-1, 6-1) handed winless Alburnett (0-6, 0-7) a 35-12 Tri-Rivers Conference defeat Friday night.

Greg Edaburn ran 57 yards for one Alburnett touchdown and scored the other on a 50-yard interception return.
