Rec Building may be shut all year

IOWA CITY — The tennis courts and track in the University of Iowa Recreation Building are usually filled to capacity on rainy days.

But balls won't be bouncing, nor locker doors clanging, in the 190-by-330-foot indoor sports facility north of Kinnick Stadium until officials figure out a way to make the building safe again.

A consulting firm is due to submit a report on restoring the structure by the end of this month, but university officials are saying it will probably remain closed for all of this school year.

Rotting support beams discovered in July by a contractor hired to replace the building's roof led to the facility being closed since that time.

For U of I Recreation Director Harry Ostrander, the closing is the kind of headache he thought had ended when the new Field House opened with a new running track, new racquetball courts, weight rooms, etc.

"It's been an interesting three years. First, it was the Field House and we just got that problem solved when this happened," he said.

Ostrander said the Recreation Building roof had been

leaking for a number of years and spot repairs had been made until \$304,000 was freed up to put on a new roof.

Now, Ostrander says, no one knows how much it will take to repair or replace the beam structures. "Whatever is done will be fairly substantial. We don't know if that means \$100,000, \$500,000 or \$1 million."

THE CLOSING is a major problem for varsity teams in tennis and track, who use the facility year-round, he said.

"As far as tennis goes, we have no alternative to offer," he said. "The teams will have to make arrangements with clubs in the Cedar Rapids area. We don't know what to do with the track team because they need an eighth-mile track and we don't have another one." A tenth-mile track in another facility just doesn't work as well, he said.

Softball and baseball teams may be scheduled in at the new indoor practice facility, he said.

"The other student users will just have to go elsewhere," he said. "A lot of regular users are concerned. They're used to having lockers in the building and using it. They want to know what is going to happen. It is just one of those things."

No-hitter carries top-rated Urbana

11th-ranked Garnavillo to an 8-3 victory over Valley of Elgin in a first-round regional matchup.

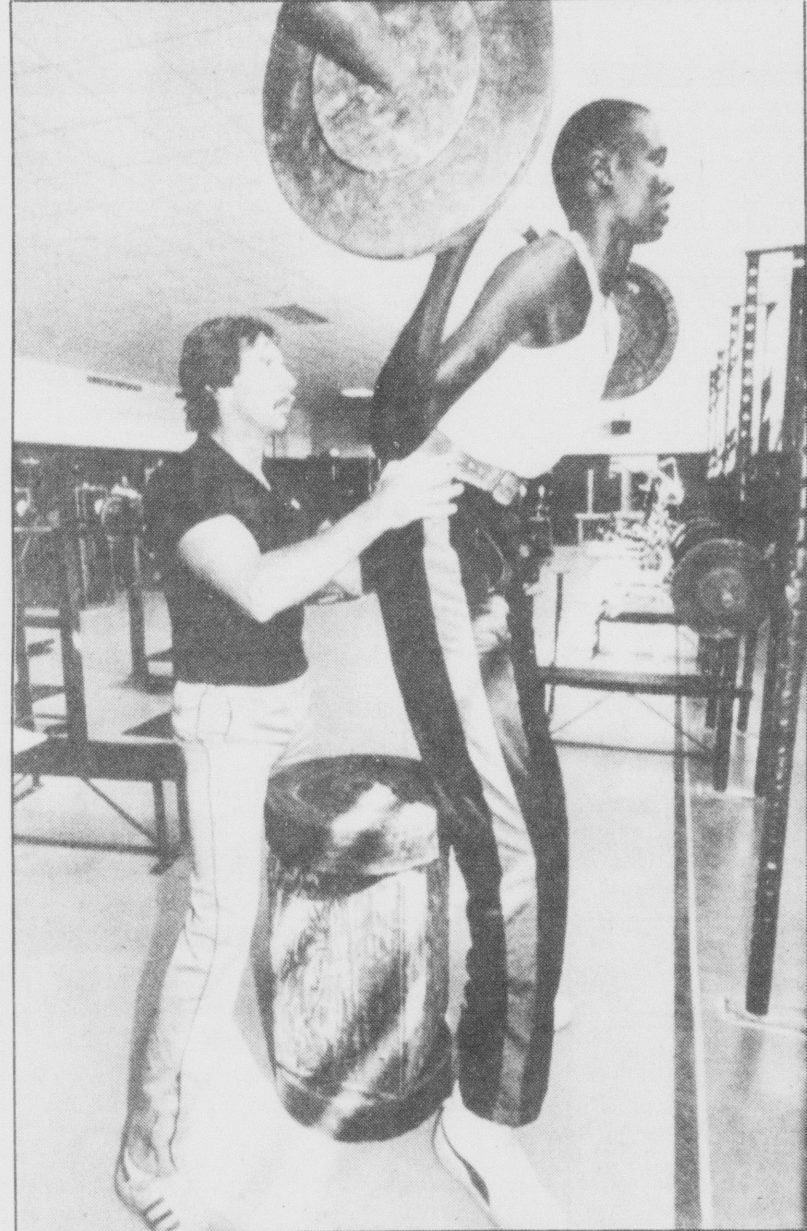
Host Elkader Central downed West Central, 7-1, in the night's second game.

Early surge gives Kennedy 1st win

Call off the funeral. Stow the shovel.

Cedar Rapids Kennedy's football team resurrected itself from the depths Thursday night at Kingston Stadium.

The Cougars, behind Brian Dixon's two touchdown passes — including a 66-yarder to Blaine Shaffer on the opening play — rolled past Dubuque Wahlert 27-14 in a Mississippi Valley Conference meeting before only 900 fans.

Kennedy, 1-3 overall and 1-2 in the conference, scored its initial win of the season by surprising Wahlert (1-3 and 0-3) from the opening gun.

Dixon, a 5-foot-9, 143-pound senior quarterback, completed a swing pass to tailback Shaffer, who eluded a group of would-be tacklers and sprinted down the sidelines to score. It was the spark Kennedy had waited for.

"We worked all week on that play," said Dixon, who finished the evening 6-of-15 for 92 yards. "We got our timing down, decided to use it the first play and it went (for a score). This win means a lot for us. We had come out on the field before as 11 individuals, but tonight we came out 11 as a unit."

Kennedy Coach Al Stiers was beaming.

"It wasn't a one-sided effort by any means," Stiers said. "The defense was just as solid as the offense. And it helped to have two linebackers back who didn't play against Washington last week (Gary

Smith and Todd Hartke)."

The Cougars' defense held Wahlert on downs after that first touchdown, and Dixon then directed a second scoring drive. Dixon completed a 56-yard scoring march with a five-yard pass to Steve Monk with 6:38 left in the first quarter.

Two series later, Wahlert was pinned at its own 4-yard line after Brett Sokol's 42-yard punt. Golden Eagles' quarterback Chris Dupont fumbled on the Wahlert 2, and Brian Dennis recovered for Kennedy. Two plays later, Frank DeShaw opened the second quarter by scoring on a one-yard plunge to make it 20-0.

Wahlert failed to get on the scoreboard in the first half, despite Dan Dimitroff intercepting a Dixon pass at the Kennedy 30. Kennedy was penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct, but it held at the 9.

The Cougars' Smith intercepted Wahlert reserve quarterback Steve Osterberger's pass in the fourth quarter and returned 27 yards to the 24. Four plays later, Shaffer ran the final nine yards.

"Penalties have been the story for us all year," said Wahlert Coach Dick Weitz, whose team was penalized 10 times for 74 yards. "We knew Kennedy was capable of playing well, if it didn't self-destruct."

Wahlert avoided a shutout by scoring twice in the final nine minutes. Fullback Brian Burgmeier (cousin of the other standout Wahlert football family) climaxed a 72-yard drive with a 12-yard TD run with 6:32 to play.

UNI faces tough foe in home opener

CEDAR FALLS — Northern Iowa is finally staying home to play a football game, but things don't get any easier for the 2-1 Panthers.

The Panthers, who squandered a lead and lost to Drake in the opener, have since whipped Kansas State 10-6 and Southwest Missouri State 38-17. They host Delaware State at 7 p.m. Saturday in the home opener at the UNI-Dome.

Delaware State is tied for eighth in the latest NCAA Division I-AA ratings and will be riding a nine-game winning streak into Saturday's contest, including a 4-0 start this season.

Delaware State is coached by William Collick, in his first year as the head coach after serving as defensive coordinator at the school from 1981-84.

Delaware State has outscored its first four opponents, 183-42.

"We're fortunate to play Delaware State now since they are a wing-T offensive team like Southwest, so preparation will be easier playing the two back-to-back," UNI Coach Darrell Mudra said. "I think our win over Southwest Missouri will give our players confidence, but we can't let down now."

The game is the first between the two schools.

Iowa-Drake basketball ticket time

DES MOINES (AP) — Single-game tickets for the Drake basketball game with Iowa at Veterans Auditorium Dec. 3 will go on sale Tuesday, Drake athletic ticket manager Reid Allen announced Wednesday.

Tickets for the game must be ordered by mail. No orders will be taken by telephone or over the counter, he said.

Tickets for the Iowa game are \$10 each and individuals may order a maximum of four. There is a \$2 handling charge per order. A check or money order must be included with the order, postmarked no earlier than Oct. 1.

Drake has been accepting season ticket and multiple-game ticket orders for more than two months. Season tickets for the 18-game

home schedule, including both sessions of the Drake Classic, are \$120.

A special "High Five" package including tickets for the five home games against Iowa, Iowa State, Wichita State, Tulsa and Creighton may be ordered at a cost of \$38 a ticket. Those tickets are on sale now.
