## Billed as average vs. average, this could be 'great game'

Iowa State Cyclones travel to K-State seeking 2 in a row in Big 8

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) - Iowa State Cach Jim Walden has never been one to oversell anything, such as his game tonight at Kansas State.

"It's not Florida State-Miami," Walden said. "But it will be two average teams playing hard, and sometimes that makes for a great game. It could be a helluva game.'

Just being home makes it special for K-State. The Wildcats (3-4 overall, 0-4 Big 8) are coming off the longest road swing of their history, an 0-4 march through Kansas, Utah State, Colorado and Oklahoma. The best game of the four may have been their last, a 16-14 loss at Oklahoma where

their dormant offense came to life.

Iowa State (3-5, 1-3) is fresh off one of its better outings, too. The Cyclones, with James McMillion setting up one touchdown with a 40-yard punt return and scoring another from 78 yards, erased a 7-0 deficit to beat Missouri 28-14.

"Overall, I thought it was one of our best defensive efforts," Walden said. "I thought our defense

played as well as it has all year."

McMillion, nicknamed "the Eel" for his slippery ways, had 118 yards in punt returns against Missouri and ranks second nationally with 19 returns for 419 yards.

He's broken three for touchdowns and erased the school record of 392 yards set by Don Ferguson Who: Iowa State vs. Kansas State

"McMillion is the best punt return guy in the nation," Walden said. "There may be some better guys out there in the world, but I'll keep the guy

It might be a good idea to keep the ball away from McMillion.

"We're going to work on that for two hours a day," said Kansas State Coach Bill Snyder. "He has scored more touchdowns on punt returns than our offense has scored in the conference. It will require a great deal of effort and preparation to

It's not as though the Wildcats are without weapons in the kicking game. Sean Snyder is second nationally in punting with a 48.02 yard average on 50 kicks.

Kansas State's struggling offense seemed to perk up at Oklahoma after coaches tried to simplify

'We made an awful lot of mistakes offensively the past few weeks," Snyder said. "We wanted to go back and get back to the basics, try to build

"Maybe they thought they were doing too Walden said. "But it looks like they've pulled it down to a base, trying to stay within the confines of that.'

The 7 p.m. kickoff on ESPN will make Big 8 history in one sense. It will mark the first season all Big 8 teams have appeared on national televi-

## QB in '93: 5-year man or rookie?

Fry will face that tough choice in rebuilding offense

Gazette sportswriter IOWA CITY — Who will start at quarterback for the Iowa Hawkeyes in 1993, Paul Burmeister or Matt Eyde?

Or will it be one of the younger guys, like Mike Duprey or Ryan Driscoll?

That's the question facing Coach Hayden Fry, who will be rebuilding next season with a young team on offense.

Should he go with a fifth-year senior like Burmeister or Eyde

and let him play quarterback for a year, or should he go with an underclassman like Duprey or Driscoll and let him ripen on the

What's best for the team: A one-year starter, or somebody who could play the position for three or four years and develop?

Fry gives the edge to Burmeister and Eyde, who are getting on-the-job auditions during the final weeks of the 1992 season because of an injury to senior Jim Hartlieb.

"You have to take one season at a time, and you play your very best," said Fry.

Eyde started against Purdue and Ohio State, now Burmeister will get the call this Saturday at Indiana. Eyde failed to take command, and now it's Burmeister's turn to look good and leap ahead in the QB derby.

"You're right, it is a step towards that for next year, but I'm

not going to really focus on that right now," said Burmeister. "Maybe I'll look back on it, and the coaches will look back on it when they evaluate for next year, but right now the most important thing is just this game.

"The most important thing right now is helping to see these seniors go out as winners.'

Eyde has completed 43 of 79 passes for 338 yards this season, with three interceptions and no touchdowns. Burmeister, who looked good in the fourth quarter against Ohio State last week, is 10 of 23 for 136 yards with one interception and no TDs.

"They've thrown nearly as many passes as Hartlieb did over a four-year period," said Fry. "They've been at every quarterback meeting and every session we have, so from a knowledge standpoint they're far ahead of the young guys. That's why Ryan Driscoll and people like that, it's going to take them

Hartlieb completed 37 of 65 passes for 485 yards and five TDs during his first three years before becoming the full-time starter this season. He dislocated his shoulder Oct. 17 against Illinois and probably is finished for the

Duprey, a redshirt freshman from Templeton, Mass., is Iowa's third-string quarterback, but he has not appeared in a game. Driscoll, a true freshman from

The Class 4A sixth-ranked J-Hawks put together a 12-play, 80-yard scoring drive in the closing minutes of a first-round playoff game against Cedar Rapids Kennedy and edged the Cougars, 13-12, at Kingston Stadi-

Jefferson improved to 9-1 and will face

10th-ranked Linn-Mar — also 9-1 — in a quarterfinal game at Linn-Mar's Armstrong Field Monday night. Both team's only loss was to second-ranked Iowa City High.

Jefferson trailed twice in the game before taking its final lead. The Cougars, who finished 6-4, held leads of 6-0 and 12-6.

"Kennedy matches up with us so well, and they're a great team," Jefferson running back/linebacker Robert Lehnherr said. "They're physical and they had us scouted


very well tonight. Hopefully we can come out against Linn-Mar and execute a little better than we did tonight.'

Jefferson Coach Jim Dostal held a short meeting with his team and left the stadium quickly before commenting on the win. Kennedy Coach Don Knock was disappointed with the loss, but proud of his team.

what proved to be the winning drive with 7:52 left in the game from its own 20 yard line, trailing, 12-6.



During the drive, quarterback Tony Henderson completed a 17-yard pass to Zac Allison and Scott Micek broke loose on a 24-yard run. The J-Hawks converted three third down opportunities as they worked down to the Cougar 24

Facing a third-and-7 and from the 24, Henderson dropped back to pass, scrambled to his right, cut back across field and ran into the end zone with 2:57 left. Chris Sarchett split the uprights with PAT kick, and Jefferson had its one-point win.

"It's a designed option," Henderson said of his winning TD run. "The first look is to pass because it's usually there, but if everyone's covered, I just pull it down and go. The line did a good job of backside blocking, and there was a huge alley

Jefferson got the ball back on a pass interception by Tory Meiborg, but fumbled it back to the Cougars on their own 45 with 1:52 left. Jefferson's Nelson Evans roughed Kennedy quarterback Scott O'Shea, moving the ball to the J-Hawk 40 and after a 3-yard loss, O'Shea ripped off a 28-yard run down to

Two plays later, Jefferson's Wade Hanson dashed the Cougars' hopes by intercepting an O'Shea pass in the end zone.

Kennedy scored the first TD with 1:49 left in the first half when Derek Roberts dove in on a 1-yard run. Jefferson tied the score with 45 seconds left in the third quarter on 6-yard pass from Henderson to Allison.

The Cougars took their 12-6 lead on a 2-yard dive by Eric Martin with 7:52 left in the game. Knock opted to go for a two-point conversion, but O'Shea was sacked attempt-

## Defense bails out Linn-Mar

Gazette sports editor Brad Walsh's interception saved the night for Linn-Mar, but it was more than one defensive play that put the Lions in the state quarterfinals Wednesday night.

Walsh's interception with 2:13 remaining preserved a 14-7 Linn-Mar victory in a Class 4A firstround playoff game at Armstrong Field.

The Lions, 18-6 in the state playoffs, will host Cedar Rapids Jefferson next Monday night in the 4A quarterfinals. They did not meet during the regular season. Linn-Mar and Jefferson both are 9-1 with losses to second-ranked Iowa City High.

Linn-Mar broke to a 14-0 halftime lead, had it cut to 14-7 with

5:58 left and had to hang on as Cedar Falls drove inside Lion territory late. Walsh picked off Scott Andreasen's underthrown pass at the Linn-Mar 29.

Cedar Falls (6-4), the No. 3 offensive team in the Mississippi Valley Conference, had just 66 total yards at halftime. For more than three quarters, Linn-Mar consistently stifled the Tigers' option attack and powerful back Seth Drenner.

"I really felt we had to play a good defensive football game to win," said Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell, who has a 16-5 record in the playoffs with the Lions. "(Rob) Strasburger, (Matt) Heaton, (Jason) Pitts . . . those three defensive ends did a bang-up job against the option. They made some big plays.'

Pat St. John's 29-yard punt return on the last play of the first period set up Linn-Mar at the Cedar Falls 32-yard line. The Lions were effective with tosssweeps to the left, as Clint Hospodarsky had gains of 10 and 18 yards to set up Clint Nelsen's 4-yard TD run with 11:38 left in the half.

Nelsen was a workhorse on the next drive, an 11-play, 70yard march on which he ran six times for 30. Heaton made a beautiful leaping catch of a 14yard pass from Jamie Hubler,

WRESTLING Okies in the Pokey STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Here is a look at the sanctions imposed on the Oklahoma State wrestling program by the NCAA Committee on Infractions and a summary of the major violations uncovered:

SANCTIONS S.AMCTIONS

1. A three-year additional probationary period imposed on the school. The probation will expire Jan. 5, 1996. Oklahoma State had been placed on four years' probation in January 1989 for football violations.

2. No postseason competition in wrestling during the 1992-93 season.

3. No additional athletically related financial aid may be awarded in wrestling prior to Aug. 1, 1994.

provided in wrestling prior to Aug. 1, 1993. 5. No members of the wrestling team who are receiving athletically re-lated financial aid may compete in ntercollegiate competition during the 1992-93 academic year

financial or other assistance during the 1992-93 and 1993-94 academic years to student-athletes to compete in any wrestling competition, other than regu-larly scheduled intercollegiate competi-

7. No members of the wrestling coaching staff may be involved in any non-collegiate wrestling activities with-in a 30-mile radius of Stillwater prior to Aug. 1, 1994. 8. No student-athlete may participate in any summer camp during the summers of 1993 and 1994 at which any member of the Oklahoma State Uni-

versity wrestling coaching staff, or any former member of the university's wrestling staff who was found to have been involved in a major violation, has any affiliation. been involved in a major violation, has any affiliation.

9. The institution's team standing in the 1992 NCAA wrestling championship shall be stricken from the record.

10. If former coach Joe Seay seeks employment as an athletics department staff member at an NCAA-member institution during the next five years, he and the involved institution must appear before the Committee on Infractions; the committee will consider whether the member institution should be subject to the show-cause procedures of NCAA legislation. Those procedures could limit that coach's athletically related duties at the new institution for a designated period.

4. Prospective student-athletes were employed in summer camps and provided them with transportation, free enrollment and other benefits that are considered inducements under NCAA legislation.

5. Summer camps were administered without proper accounting and auditing procedures, which allowed some student-athletes to receive benefits to which they were not entitled.

6. Jobs and funds not known to or under the control of the university were provided to coaching staff members.
