Voila! Kennedy like a new team

Cougars block, tackle, kick ... get first win

CEDAR RAPIDS — There was a touch of magic in the air at fog-shrouded Kingston Stadium Thursday night.

A Cedar Rapids Kennedy offense that

hadn't scored a point in 12 straight quarters coming in watched as — poof! — 10 points materialized on the Kings-

ton scoreboard.

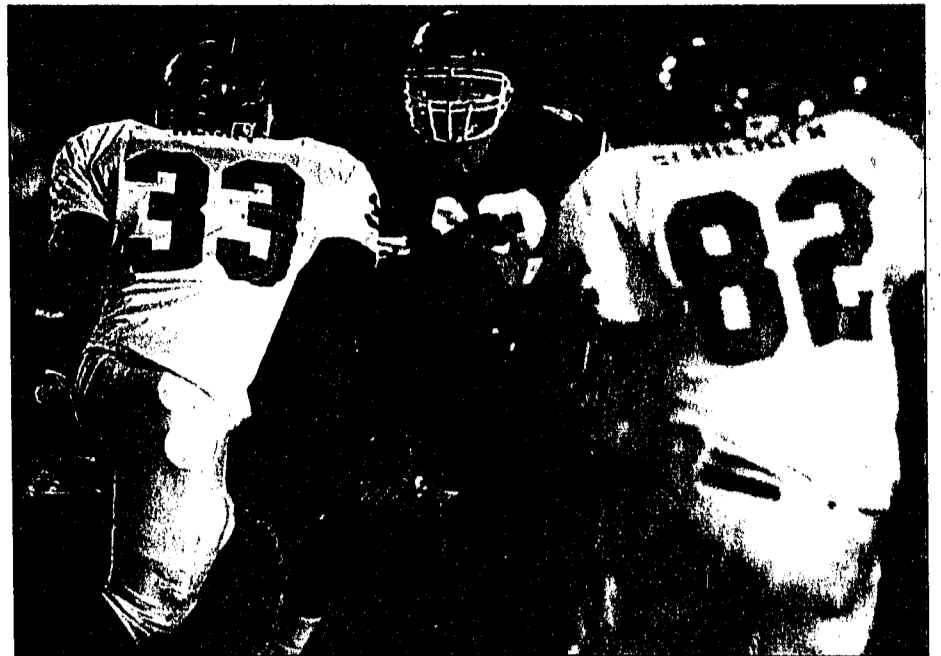
A Cougar defense that had been riddled for 1,518 yards and 148 points in its first four games disappeared into the soupy sky and the defense that appeared in its place came within 9 minutes of posting a shutout.

And reserve tailback Mike Russell popped out of a hat like a white rabbit to rush for 58 yards and Kennedy's lone touchdown in the third quarter, sending Waterloo West back on its heels.

Taken as a whole, the dash of magic produced a 10-6 Kennedy win over West, the Cougars' first of the 2002 Mississippi Valley Conference season.

Cards trump both aces

St. Louis on brink of a sweep, but Rolen may be out

PHOENIX (AP) — They battered Randy Johnson and eased past Curt Schilling. The St. Louis Cardinals headed home needing one victory to finish off the World Series champions Arizona Diamondbacks.

But an injury to Scott Rolen dampened the Cardinals' 2-1 triumph over the Diamondbacks on Thursday.

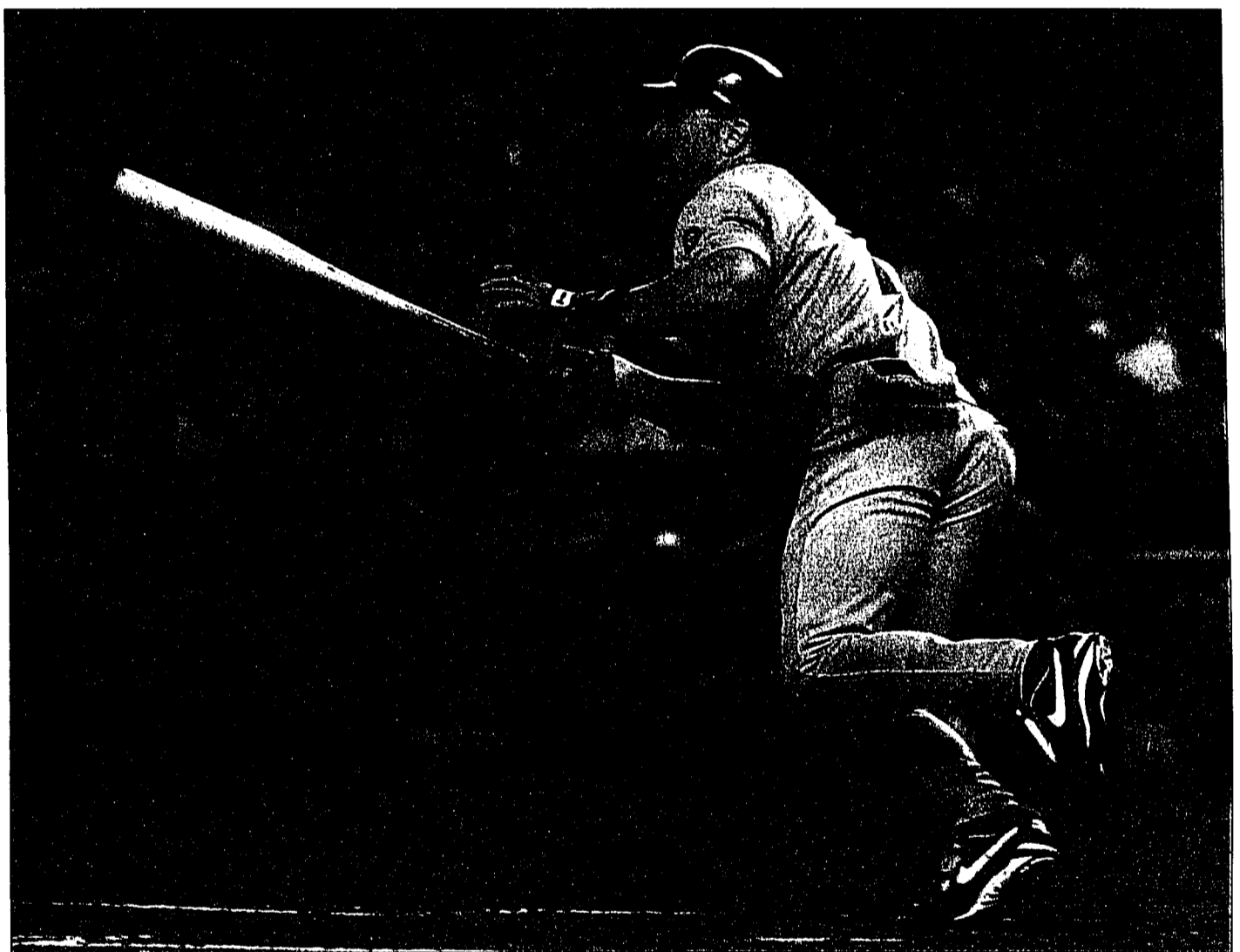
Miguel Cairo's ninth-inning single off reliever Mike Kopeck drove in Edgar Renteria with the go-ahead run for the Cardinals, who swept the first two games of the best-of-five series.

"A split would have been good for us," said Chuck Finley, who blanked Arizona for 6½ innings. "Obviously, coming out of here 2-0 looks very, very good. This is what we dreamed of doing."

Rolen left after he was clipped in the left side by pinch-runner Alex Cintron while scooping up a grounder in the seventh inning. X-rays were negative, and the preliminary diagnosis was a sprained shoulder. Further tests were scheduled for today in St. Louis.

"I do think that his continuing to play for sure in this series is very questionable," Manager Tony La Russa said. "We'll have our fingers crossed through tomorrow, but I think there's a chance he might have played his last game (this year)."

The Diamondbacks, who had trailed 1-0 since the third

inning on J.D. Drew's two-out homer off Schilling, tied it with an unearned run in the eighth.

Quinton McCracken doubled over the outstretched glove of the right fielder Drew to score Greg Colbrunn, who had reached on a fielding error by Albert Pujols — Rolen's replacement at third.

With the late Darryl Kile's

widow Flynn again in the stands, as she was in Tuesday night's opener, the inspired Cardinals moved with a win of returning to the NL championship series for the second time in three seasons.

"They're the world champions and will keep fighting until the end," the Cardinals'

Now everybody knows he can play

IOWA CITY — For three years, one thought sat in the back of Derek Pagel's mind, in the pit of his stomach, and in his heart. For three years, the Iowa free safety sat on the bench.

"Since the beginning, I always thought I could play here," Pagel said. "Sometimes I thought I wasn't given the opportunity."

Until his junior year, Pagel

personified frustration. He was a walk-on. He wasn't seeing the field much. A promising fresh-

man named Bob Sanders was playing his position. He was ready to go.

The night before the 2001 spring game came an ultimatum.

"He called that night and said, 'Bring the camera, this might be the last time I'm on the field down here,'" said Jeannette Pagel, Derek's mother. "He didn't play a lot that spring game. Afterwards, he came out of the locker room — he was in tears."

Things are different today.

"For me, it's really a dream come true," Pagel said. "Ev-

Board in Control will hear Pierce's appeal

Iowa basketball player is accused of sexual assault

IOWA CITY — University of Iowa men's basketball player Pierre Pierce will have the appeal of his suspension heard by the school's Board in Control of Athletics this month, board chairman Nicholas Colangelo said Thursday.

Colangelo added that the board has not set a date for the hearing.

Pierce was suspended indefinitely from all basketball-related activities Tuesday after Iowa City police accused the sophomore guard of third-degree sexual assault.

Pierce's appeal will be heard by the heads of the board's six standing committees and Colangelo, who will preside over the hearing but not cast a vote. The board members will either uphold or overturn with a majority vote Athletics Director Bob Bowsby's decision to suspend Pierce.

"The decision of the board will be the final decision of athletics," Colangelo said. If the board upholds Pierce's suspension, he can appeal to UI Interim President Willard "Sandy" Boyd. If the president also upholds the suspension, Pierce may appeal to the state Board of Regents, who are not required to hear his case.

After that, Pierce's only option would be through the courts.

Pierce is accused of sexually assaulting a woman Sept. 7 at 725 Orchard St., where Pierce lives, a criminal complaint filed by Iowa City police states. The complaint states the victim was at Pierce's apartment with other friends and during contact with the victim, the defendant began performing unwanted sex acts.

When the victim tried to push the defendant away, he held his hands over her head and continued to perform sex acts against her will, the complaint states.

When the victim tried to scream, the defendant held his hand over her mouth, according to the complaint.

now," said Russell, a 5-foot-8, 145-pound junior who finished with 64 yards on 13 carries to pace a 144-yard Kennedy rushing attack.

"This is a new season for us. We're forgetting the past."

The Cougars improved to 1-4 and broke a five-game losing streak dating to the final week of last year's regular season. They finally scored for the first time in 14 quarters when Jake Settle hit a 24-yard field goal as time expired in the second quarter Thursday night.

The momentum created by those three points seemed to carry over into the second half.

"We had been shut out the last three games in a row. We hadn't been in the end zone — no field goals or anything," Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis said. "The field goal was big because it gave us some confidence going into the locker room. We needed to make some adjustments coaching-wise (in the second half) and once we did that, we started moving the ball."

The Cougars went 70 yards on nine plays on their second possession of the third quarter with Russell carrying six times for 52 yards in the drive. He covered the last 2 by going off right tackle for a touchdown with 1:47 left in the frame.

"We just started making plays and doing what we can do," Russell said. "It was our team out there playing like we know we can."

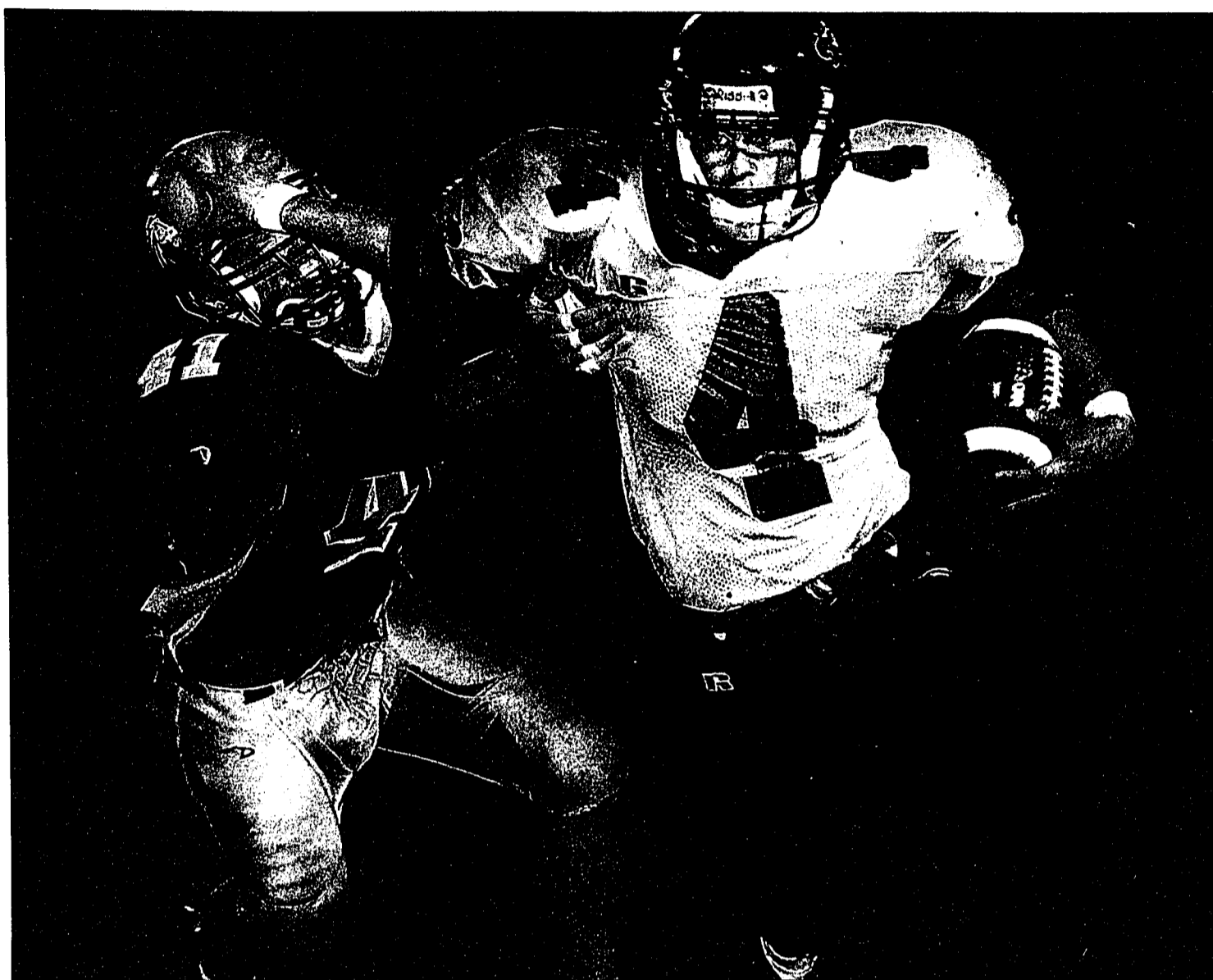
The Kennedy defense held the Wahawks (2-3) to 261 total yards with 91 of those coming on a touchdown pass from Nate Lane to David Banks with 9:16 left in the game.

West got deep in Cougar territory twice in the first half, but kicker Danny Dunning had a 24-yard field goal attempt miss wide right in the first period and had a 42-yard attempt blocked in the second period.

Kennedy will be part of a double-header at Kingston next Friday night to celebrate the stadium's 50th anniversary.

The Cougars will face Jefferson in the first of two games at 5:30 p.m. Washington and Xavier play in the nightcap.

Hempstead rallies by Prairie

DUBUQUE — Dubuque Hempstead rallied from a 13-point deficit with one quarter to play Thursday night to defeat Cedar Rapids Prairie, 20-19, in a Mississippi Valley Conference football game at Dalzell Field.

Hempstead (4-1) scored all its points off four Prairie turnovers, including two Hawk fumbles in the fourth quarter.

Prairie (3-2) moved the to Hempstead's 20 on its last drive, but a false start backed the Hawks up to the 25 and a 42-yard field goal attempt by Nate Klein missed when he

slipped on the wet grass with 24 seconds left.

"We gave the ball over too much," said Prairie Coach Craig Jelinek. "They had us outmanned at probably eight or nine positions at every snap of the ball. Our kids played with great heart. You just can't turn the ball over in a championship game. Otherwise, we were able to control the game offensively and defensively."

Hempstead opened the scoring on a Dan Petersen 28-yard

field goal in the first quarter, but Prairie took the lead later in the period on a 1-yard run by Jason Kohl. Petersen added a 31-yard field goal in the second quarter, countered by a Prairie touchdown on a 2-yard pass from Ryan Hass to Dan Wolfe.

The extra point kick missed, and Prairie led at halftime, 13-6.

The Hawks scored on a 56-yard run by Casey Clark in the third quarter to take a 19-6 lead. Prairie tried to pass for two points but didn't convert.

"We knew the numbers would say to kick the extra

point," Jelinek said, "but we just didn't trust our extra point kicking."

Then came the turnovers and Hempstead's two fourth-quarter touchdowns.

"I asked them to put their heart out there on the line, and that's why they're so upset," Jelinek said. "If their heart wasn't out there, it wouldn't have bothered them they lost. But these kids played with great heart against a lot better talent."

"Now we've got two (losses) and they've got one ... But the emotional downside of this is going to be very difficult."

Everything I've wanted, I think, has come to me so far."

Say what?

Pagel met with Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz and then-linebackers coach Bret Bielema after that spring game. They told him if he put on a little size, he'd be considered for time in nickel packages.

Still, he went into informal summer workouts thinking he might transfer, probably to Division III Wartburg in Waverly. He just wanted to play.

"It was wide open in the air for me," Pagel said. "If I didn't have a good camp, I was probably going to be out of here. I think it was a week into camp they started working me into some third down situations. I kind of took advantage of that opportunity, I think."

Umm ... yeah. Pagel saw the field last season as a free safety, racking up 44 tackles, including four in the Alamo Bowl. This season, he's tied for third on the team with 31 tackles, tied for the team lead with two interceptions and blocked an extra point against Penn State.

So he can play. That's why he was so frustrated.

"I was just ready to leave," he said "I was as down as anybody can be in their football career."

There was just something keeping him at Iowa.

"I think in the back of his mind was, 'If I don't try out for Division I, play at Iowa, I'll never know if I could make it or not,'" said Richard Pagel, Derek's father.

His teammates don't know what they would do without Pagel.

"Through it all, he's kept a positive attitude," fellow fifth-year senior David Porter said. "He has really, really impressed me with his ability to bounce back. He's asserted himself as one of our leaders. We depend on him more than he depends on us."

Pagel is the Wizard of Vids for the secondary. A stop into the Iowa football complex will probably yield a glimpse of Pagel's face showered in the glow of a television.

"He's an excellent film watcher," said Sanders, Pagel's partner at safety. "He pretty much knows in and out what they're going to come in and what they're going to do on us. Things you don't pick up as a strong safety, a guy like Pagel will be able to help you out."

Ferentz can't say enough about what has become "The Derek Pagel Story."

"I think all of us in sports have doubts at some times about whatever you're doing," Ferentz said. "Fortunately for all of us, he stuck it out and the rest is history."

A crazy history. "It's amazing," Pagel said. "The highs are so high and the lows are so low ... I'm really running on a high right now."

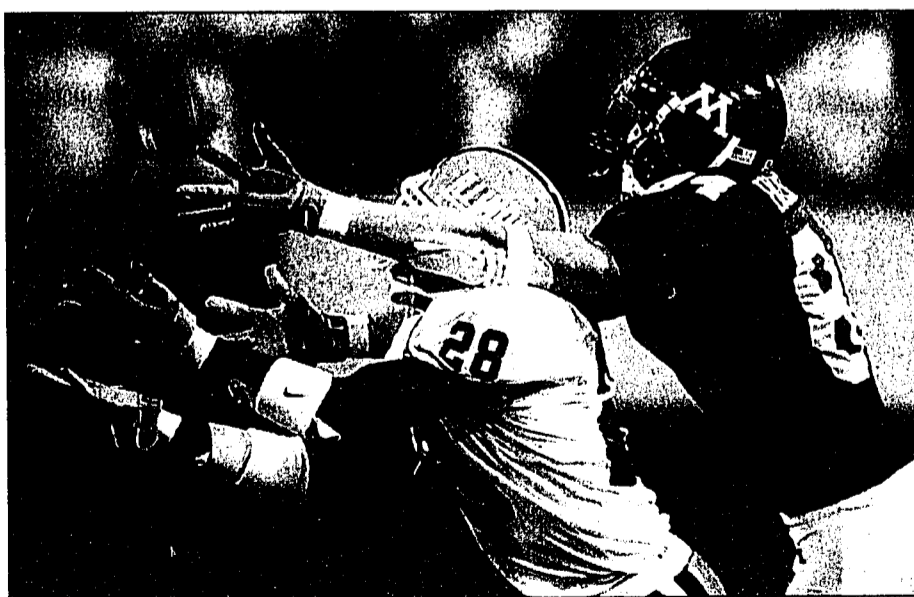
The Illini switched from Ward to

Beutjer was 14-for-29 for 165 yards, a touchdown and no interceptions. He fumbled three times, losing one.

Goodale rejoins Hawks, ready to challenge at 125

Trent Goodale is back on the Iowa wrestling team.

A three-time state champion from Osage who won 159 of 165 prep matches, Goodale was forced to sit out last year because he didn't meet eligibility requirements for incoming freshmen.

He stayed in school and end-

ed up a volunteer assistant at Iowa City West High School. But he wasn't allowed to practice with the Hawkeye team. He's back, eligible and ready to challenge at 125 pounds.

"Being out of the room hurt him a little bit," Iowa Coach Jim Zalesky said. "But he's

coming in hungrier than a freshman. We're happy to have him back in the room."

Goodale is a sophomore, but can regain his lost season of eligibility if he graduates in four years.

He will battle Matt Morkel, Matt Shankey and Jesse Zobeck to determine who will challenge all-American Luke Eustice for the starting spot.

"It's good any time you have depth in your room," Zalesky said.

Eustice, an NCAA runner-up last March, is recovering from shoulder surgery in May, but is looking good, Zalesky said.

"He wrestled with a bad shoulder last year," Zalesky said. "People don't realize, but he practiced maybe 20 times all year ... he's tough."

The Iowa wrestling team is practicing three times a week and will hold a Saturday morning session before the Iowa-Purdue football game. The wrestling room will be open to the public and practice will start at 8:30 a.m.

The team will hold wrestle-offs Nov. 8, the first day of its two-day coaches clinic. The opener is Nov. 15 at Minnesota.

Zalesky said there are few surprises in the lineup. He said red-shirt freshman Paul Bradley will battle veterans Trey Clark and Randy Fulsaa at 197, and freshman Mark Mueller will be in the mix at 165.

"I told (Mueller) I'm going with the best wrestler at that weight," Zalesky said.
